Your child has just finished taking their NWEA MAP assessments (Grades K-5) in the areas of Reading and Mathematics. We will be using this information to better target our instruction to meet your child's individual needs.

The intermediate grades (3-5) are continuing to prepare for the Wisconsin Forward state assessment that they will begin to take in the Spring. This test replaces the Badger Exam. This is one of the most important assessments they will take this year, and I am extremely excited to see how well they perform

Giese's second PTA meeting of the year will take place on Tuesday, October 13 at 6:00pm in the library. Your help and support is extremely important, and we welcome all interested parties to attend and learn more about this organization.

Student Drop-Off & Pick-Up

October 22nd is International Stuttering Awareness Day

Individuals and support groups all over the world observe International Stuttering Awareness day every October 22nd. Some wear a turquoise-colored ribbon symbolizing their support to the cause and to the individuals that stutter.



Stuttering affects the overall fluency of speech. It typically begins during childhood, and in some cases, lasts a lifetime. The disorder is characterized by disfluencies, which are disrupted moments in the production of speech, which may manifest in several forms, including: interjections (excessive ahs, uhs, ums), word repetitions (b-b-b-b-ike or my-my-my-my), or blocks (tense long pauses/hesitations while speaking) just to name a few.

Most intervention programs for people who stutter are "behavioral," and designed to teach the individual specific skills or behaviors that lead to improved oral communication. Many speech-language pathologists teach strategies that focus on controlling the rate of speech, breath control, and producing smoother transitions from word-to-word or utterance-to-utterance. Over time, people learn to produce smoother speech at faster rates, in longer sentences, and in more challenging situations until speech sounds both fluent and natural.

Kindergarten

RULE TIME: The children are learning new rules for school. Kindergarteners follow the S.A.F.E. rules, which stand for how to Sit during our learning, the kind of Attitude we should have, how to be Friendly, and to include Everyone in our daily activities.

LEARNING TIME: Children are also getting use to a schedule full of learning, fun, and friendship. We are working on how to take turns, share, and be good listeners. We also want to stress a learning attitude saying "I Think I Can, I Think I Can" (or at least I can try.) The best way to learn is to try and experiment and try again and again. Practice at school and at home is needed to become successful in reading, math, and writing.

WEATHER TIME: Wisconsin weather is constantly changing. Just a reminder to please dress your child for the weather especially for being outside for the daily 15 minute recess. It is also helpful to have an extra sweatshirt to put on or take off in the classroom as the temperatures change inside, too.

FUN TIMES: October is a busy month with the change of season and harvest time. We also have Fire Prevention week. During the month, all kindergarten classes will visit the pumpkin farm. Chaperones must be WINGS approved to attend. Please turn in permission slips and fees ASAP, thanks. Near the end of the month we will have a Costume Parade and Party in our homerooms.

FAMILY TIMES: Thank you to all the families for sharing the evening with us at open house. It was a pleasure to meet you and share our excitement about teaching your child. Conferences will be coming up in November, more information will be sent home by your homeroom teacher during the month.

We are off to a great start. If you have any questions, please let us know.

First Grade

We would like to thank all the families who came to Open House on August 26th.

Please continue to practice Kindergarten sight words. There are 37 Kindergarten sight words in all. Watch for new words to come home throughout the year. All students should be able to read these words without sounding them out. Read with your child daily. Scholastic book orders will come home. Book prices vary and begin at \$1. Please send cash or check (made out to Scholastic) along with the order form to school. You may also order on- line.

Our Math series is enVision. We have finished Topics 1 & 2, numbers to 12, and comparing and ordering numbers. Please review the math worksheets that come home with your child. Our next topics are Understanding Addition and Understanding Subtraction. Please practice basic addition and subtraction math facts. Flash cards would be beneficial.

Please turn in your WINGS volunteer forms if you plan on being a chaperone or working as a volunteer in our classrooms or school this year. It can take a while to get approved so get it in ASAP.

Please, check with your child or their teacher for any school supplies that your child may be missing, especially their emergency green card. Send any missing supplies to school as soon as possible. Look for information to come home about our Family game Night on Thursday, October 15th from 6-7p.m. Our Halloween party, parade, and dance will be on Thursday, October 29th. More information will be coming home soon.

Second Grade

We are off to a great start in second grade. MAP testing is over and we are completing PALS assessment as well. We will use this data to help drive our instruction and better meet your child's needs this year. Please take a moment each day to ask your child what we are working on and how the school day went. This helps them to understand that their education is important.

We are still in need of WINGS volunteers for our classrooms and the YMCA swimming lessons that will begin on October 29th. If you are interested or have questions please contact your child's teacher. We appreciate your participation and support.

As the weather begins to turn cooler please remind your child to dress in layers. They are welcome to leave a sweatshirt at school on their hook so they are always prepared.

We look forward to working together to make this year a positive experience for all of us!

Third Grade

Third grade is off to a great start. Your child's success in third grade depends on reinforcement work at home. You can expect to see a list of spelling words and vocabulary words (with meanings) come home every Friday. Helping your child at home will be very beneficial to his/her success. Your child should also be reading and practicing math facts at home nightly. This is in addition to any other homework that may be sent home. In Topic 1 of Math, we will be working on counting money. It is important that your child know the names of the coins, the value, and be able to count with them.

As a school we are working on a PBIS skill of the month. September's skill is "following instructions". Some of the students have been having some difficulty in this area. Please help us by reinforcing the importance of paying attention at all times.

Please feel free to contact any of us with questions and/or concerns.

Fourth Grade

Can you believe that September is already drawing to a close and that we have been in school for more than 4 weeks already?

We have completed MAP testing for the fall. We will be discussing your child's scores with them, and then we will send home a copy of the score for them to share with you. Please be on the lookout for that.

One item that is new for your fourth grader is the assignment book page. We still have many students forgetting to get these signed each night and brought back to school with them for us to see. Please take a moment each night to look at these pages, discuss what your child has finished or needs to complete that evening, and then to return them to school the following morning. This is teaching your child organization and responsibility.

We had an amazing trip to the ecology center in September. We conducted water experiments, learned about the Watershed, and finally about the water cycle. The students had a great time participating.

In October we have a field trip to visit Wustum Art Museum here in Racine. The cost will be \$3.00. Be on the lookout for more information that will be coming home soon.

This has been an awesome start to the school year. Thank you for being a support system for us. Keep encouraging your kids to be responsible, respectful, and safe like they are, and the year should be great!

Fifth Grade

Welcome to fifth grade! We are off to a great start. The students enjoyed a field trip to the planetarium this past Thursday. We have another free field trip coming up in October. We will be seeing a School House Rock performance at the Golden Rondelle, sponsored by S.C. Johnson. Next week we will also be starting a new program called Life Skills. This program is approximately 45 minutes per week and will take place weekly until the holiday break. The

program helps students be aware of the peer pressures around them and how to stand up for what is right. It's very educational and gives the children knowledge to help deal with relevant issues for their age.

It is our responsibility as fifth grade teachers to prepare your child for the middle school. Please go over your child's homework each night and help them to stay organized. If you ever have any questions, please feel free to call, e-mail or write notes in the daily assignment notebook. Here's to a wonderful fifth grade year!

LICORICE SALE RETURNS EVERY FRIDAY




