

Dear Giese Families,

Welcome to the April Edition of the 2016-2017 *Cheetah Chatter*. This is probably our busiest month of the year. There are a lot of different activities and events taking place that I want to make you aware of. Your continued support is so important to what we do around here!

April brings another round of testing. We will take the Forward Exam. We are encouraging our students to do their best.

We just completed the third quarter, which officially ended on Friday, March 24th. If you were unable to make it to conferences, your child's report card will be sent home to you. We still encourage you to meet with your child's teacher so you know what to expect for the fourth quarter

Spring Recess will begin on April 13th at 2:45. The students will return to school on Monday, April 24th. Enjoy your time off!!! When we return, it is back to work as usual. We will be preparing for the Spring MAP tests




4 Yr. Old Kindergarten

First Grade

We have wrapped up three quarters of the school year with one more to go. Let's do our best to make it great! There is still a lot of learning to be done, so please encourage your child to stay focused. Spring MAP testing for 1st grade will begin soon. This is the last time your child will take the MAP test this school year. This is a very important test. Please make sure your child is well rested and fed before he or she takes the test.

We are working on double-digit addition and subtraction in math. Please remember to keep practicing addition and subtraction facts. Encourage reading and writing at home also. The Racine Public Library is always an excellent resource for finding books your child will enjoy reading.

Please remember to sign and return the lower part of the report card. Look for information to come home about summer school. Thank you to all of those who attended the Spring Parent-Teacher Conferences!

Second Grade

It is hard to believe that it is April. Thank you to all the parents who attended parent teacher conferences. Spring break starts on Friday, April 14 and the students return to school on Monday, April 24. Please check your child's backpack for their report card and discuss it with them. We have a lot of learning left to do this year. Our last round of MAP testing will be in early May. Please continue to work with your child at home on their reading and math skills as we continue to push forward here at school.

Third Grade

Although it may be hard to believe, we have come to the final quarter of the school year. Report cards were sent home today. Please take some time to look them over with your child. The bottom portion should be signed and returned as soon as possible. Our students have been taking the Forward Exam. This is a state test that all Wisconsin third graders take.

Your child should be continuing to practice memorizing their basic facts at home, as well as spending time reading nightly. If you have Internet access, please encourage your child to work on Compass Learning, First In Math and they can also read books at their level on Raz Kids.

We have been experiencing some behaviors that don't line up with our school/classroom expectations. Please help us by reinforcing the importance of following all school/classroom rules.

Fourth Grade

Wow! Where has this school year gone? We are entering the last quarter of the school year, and we still have much learning to be done. PLEASE continue practicing flash cards at home for multiplication and division.

We will be having a fundraiser in April to help us earn extra money for our fourth grade. The fundraiser will involve students taking orders from other students at school for Mother's Day. We will be selling carnations for Mother's Day, and we will be charging \$1.00 for each flower. The students will be making signs and order forms to send home in April.

Many students are running low on pencils. Could you please ask your child if they are in need of anymore? If so, please send them.

In social studies we will begin to learn about the east. Please be on the lookout for vocabulary to study and states and capitals to practice.

At the end of the month we will jump into our plants unit for Science as spring is in full spring. This is always a fun unit for us to begin planting things to grown and learn about the life cycle of a plant.

Excellent attendance is essential to school success. Students are expected, when healthy, to attend all scheduled classes and activities on time except as excused by the school. When students are ill, parents/guardians need to report their child's absence by calling our 24 hour Attendance line 262-664-8255 even if you have notified the teacher.

If your child has been absent 10+ days this semester/year due to illness or other reasons, these absences are considered excessive and we will need a medical statement from your child's physician to excuse her/him for the remainder of this school term. All remaining absences, which are not accompanied by a doctor's excuse, will be treated as truancies as per our District Policy.

School Success Starts Early

Getting Kids to Relate to Their Teacher Is the Best Strategy

n my work with kids and teachers over the years, I've witnessed the many benefits of healthy student-teacher relationships. Establishing a connection between your child and his or her teachers is key to success in school and throughout life.

Regardless of a child's scholastic abilities, parents can show him or her how to get along with teachers. Before your kids start school, give them a powerful advantage over other children by teaching them the following practical, easy-to-learn skills:

Tip 1: Smile and say "hello" to your teacher everyday.

Kids who greet their teachers with a smile and a warm "hello" every morning usually have fewer problems with their teachers throughout the day. It is important, however, for parents to help their kids understand it is necessary to not overdo it. Try practicing with your child.

Tip 2: Pay attention to your teacher. While your teacher is talking, look him or her in the eyes, smile, and nod.

Love and Logic parents know that helping their child relate to teachers will increase the child's interest in what is being taught. One parent I know had a daughter who experienced difficulty paying attention in class.

Af ter the parent suggested looking at the teacher, smiling, and nodding, she became more engaged in her learn-ing and was better prepared to ask questions about the lessons.

Teachers enjoy working with children who are interested in learning. Students who are attentive and "encourage" their teachers during the lesson have an advan-

tage over those who do not. In addition, these children will be more comfortable approaching a teacher with any concerns they may have.

Tip 3: Raise your hand periodically to ask a question about the lesson.

A child who asks questions shows the teacher he or she is paying attention to the lesson being taught.

Tip 4: Say "please" and "thank you."

It is important for parents to model good manners. At the Love and Logic Institute, we've found that children learn much more from our actions than from our words. What we say in front of our kids is more important than what we say to them. For example, when your child is nearby, you might say to your spouse, "I sure do appreciate all of your help today around the house. Thank you so much."

Kids who use these skills in school will have an advantage over kids who do not. These skills also will carry over to the workforce, which will give children an advantage over others throughout their professional lives.

One student I know suffered from significant learning problems. Many people thought he would not be successful in his professional life. Much to their surprise, however, he went on to have a wonderful career and did better than kids who were much "brighter," because his parents taught and reinforced good relationship skills over and over again.

Don't wait! Start using these Love and Logic techniques and join the thousands of parents who are raising successful, responsible kids.

April is National Autism Awareness Month

The Autism Society has chosen the month of April to celebrate National Autism Awareness. Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a complex developmental disability, which consists of certain behaviors that affect each individual differently and to varying degrees. It typically appears in individuals within the first three years of life and affects the person's ability to communicate and interact with others. There is no known single cause of autism. Statistic reports of 2014 revealed the prevalence of autism is found in 1 of every 68 children born in the United States and almost 1 of 54 boys. Autism is treatable, but never "outgrown." Early identification and interventions can lead to significantly improved outcomes.

A few signs to look for in the children in your life: lack of or delay in spoken language, repetitive use of language and/or motor mannerisms (e.g., hand-flapping, twirling objects), little or no eye contact, lack of interest in peer relationships, lack of spontaneous or make-believe play, and/or persistent fixation on parts of objects. The National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) lists five specific behaviors that indicate further evaluation may be necessary: by 12 months: does not babble or coo, gesture, point, wave or grasp; by 16 months: does not say single words; by 24 months: does not say 2-word phrases on his/her own; and at any age has a loss of any language or social skill.

Having these behaviors does not mean your child has autism, but individuals demonstrating these behaviors should be evaluated by a multi-disciplinary team. This team may include a neurologist, psychologist, developmental pediatrician, speech/language therapist, learning consultant, or other professionals knowledgeable about autism.
