#### 4 Yr. Old Kindergarten

I am excited to see the first signs of spring! I look forward to outdoor recess after this long winter of being inside. Please dress your child appropriately for the weather, as we will go outside as often as possible. I appreciate a change of shoes to help keep our classroom free of mud. We will work on many spring themed activities throughout the season. We will have prevent blindness vision screening on April 4<sup>th</sup>. Pals literacy screening begins on April 25<sup>th</sup>. Please reinforce early literacy skills at home, reading to your child is one of the most important things you can do. I appreciate all of the hard work going on at home, and it is exciting to watch all of the children bloom socially and academically.

#### Kindergarten

We are almost done with the third quarter. Report cards will be sent home in the next few weeks, let us know if you have any comments or concerns. The students are truly blossoming in their abilities, confidence, and friendships. We are very proud of the extra work they are doing at home to refine the skills taught at school. Continue to practice counting by 1's, 2's, 5's, & 10's. The children should also be working on learning all high frequency words and practicing blending letters to build, read, and spell words. We have several fun events planned for the spring. We will have a special concert at our annual Mother's Day Tea on Friday 5/6. There will be a field trip to the Racine Zoo on Tuesday 5/31. Please note the permission slip, lunch order, and fees are due Monday 5/2. Thanks so much for your continued support of our efforts to provide the best education for your child. Enjoy the ever-changing spring weather.

#### **First Grade**

It's hard to believe third quarter is almost over and the end of the year is rapidly approaching. There is still a lot of learning to be done, so please encourage your child to stay focused. Spring MAP testing for 1st grade will begin soon. This is the last time your child will take the MAP test this school year. We will also take the PALS test before the

end of May. These are very important tests. Please make sure your child is well rested and fed before he or she takes each test.

We are working on the topic of telling time in math. In first grade we work on telling time to the hour and half hour. Our next topic will be addition facts to 18. Please remember to keep practicing addition and subtraction facts. Encourage reading and writing at home also. The Racine Public Library is always an excellent resource for finding books your child will enjoy reading.

#### **Second Grade**

Happy Spring! It seems as if spring has finally arrived! Please remind your child to dress for the weather. Often sweatshirts are needed in and outdoors. We will be taking a fieldtrip to the hospital this month. Watch for permission slips. This trip is paid for by the West Racine Kiwanis. Our grade will be going two separate days. Our final MAP testing will soon be here as well. We'll keep you posted on dates so you can prepare your child for proper rest and a good breakfast. As always, thank you for your continued support.

#### Third Grade

Although it may be hard to believe, we have come to the final quarter of the school year. Report cards will be sent home sometime in the next few weeks. Please take some time to look them over with your child. The bottom portion should be signed and returned as soon as possible. Our students will be taking the Forward Exam next month. This is a new state test that all Wisconsin third graders take.

Your child should be continuing to practice memorizing their basic facts at home, as well as spending time reading nightly. If you have Internet access, please encourage your child to work on Compass Learning and First In Math.

Master Gardner program will visit third grade at the end of April. Your child will be bringing home their terrarium along with instructions for their care.

We have been experiencing some behaviors that don't line up with our school/classroom expectations. Please help us by reinforcing the importance of following all school/classroom rules.

#### **Fourth Grade**

As we look forward to spring break, we hope to find everyone excited. We hope that everyone returns refreshed and ready to get back to school. We will be having a fundraiser towards the end of April for Mother's Day. The fundraiser will involve students taking orders from other students at school for Mother's Day. We will be selling carnations for Mother's Day, and we will be charging \$1.00 for each flower. The students will be making signs and order forms to send home at the end of April.

In math we will be working more with geometry. We will area and perimeter. Please continue working on multiplication and division facts even though we have finished these chapters.

Many students are running low on pencils. Could you please ask your child if they are in need of any more. If so, please send them.

The week after we return from spring break we will begin the Spring MAP assessment. This is the final MAP assessment for the spring of this school year. It is very important that you child will get enough rest, have breakfast, and be prepared to work their hardest on this test. Please pump your kids up with support and let's watch those scores soar.

Report cards will be coming out very soon. Please look them over carefully and stay in touch if you have any concerns.

# **April is National Autism Awareness Month**



The Autism Society has chosen the month of April to celebrate National Autism Awareness. Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a complex developmental disability, which consists of certain behaviors that affect each individual differently and to varying degrees. It typically appears in individuals within the first three years of life and affects the person's ability to communicate and interact with others. There is no known single cause of autism. Statistic reports of 2014 revealed the prevalence of autism is found in 1 of every 68 children born in the United States and almost 1 of 54 boys. Autism is treatable, but never "outgrown." Early identification and interventions can lead to significantly improved outcomes.

A few signs to look for in the children in your life: lack of or delay in spoken language, repetitive use of language and/or motor mannerisms (e.g., hand-flapping, twirling objects), little or no eye contact, lack of interest in peer relationships, lack of spontaneous or make-believe play, and/or persistent fixation on parts of objects. The National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) lists five specific behaviors that indicate further evaluation may be necessary: by 12 months: does not babble or coo, gesture, point, wave or grasp; by 16 months: does not say single words; by 24 months: does not say 2-word phrases on his/her own; and at any age has a loss of any language or social skill.

Having these behaviors does not mean your child has autism, but individuals demonstrating these behaviors should be evaluated by a multi-disciplinary team. This team may include a neurologist, psychologist, developmental pediatrician, speech/language therapist, learning consultant, or other professionals knowledgeable about autism.
