

It is an exciting time to be a part of the Racine Unified School District. Not only are we beginning to build new schools, planning exciting expansions and modernizing our existing facilities, we're also launching a new five-year strategic plan.

During the last year, nearly 60 community members partnered with RUSD leaders, teachers, staff, students and families to develop the strategic plan that will guide the District and improve outcomes for students over the next five years. Strategic Plan 2027 has four strategic priorities: Student Success, Climate and Culture, Systems, Accountability and Growth and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI). It includes six major District-wide goals:

- 1. 86% graduation rate ready for career, college, life
- 2. 75% of pre-3rd grade students reading on grade level
- 3. 86% of middle school students graduating ready for high school
- 4. Elimination of variances in results across all student groups, regardless of race/ethnicity, gender, socioeconomic status, etc.
- 5. 80% of families will choose RUSD for their children
- 6. 100% of District facilities will have modern infrastructure (technology, buildings and safety and security features)

You will get a glimpse of some of the work we are doing to achieve these goals within this report, but this is just beginning. We are excited to work together with you to build a bright future for our students!

2 Brand New Schools | 4 School Expansions to K-8s | 15 Schools Getting Major Renovations



Work is underway to modernize and improve the District's learning environments, especially for science, technology, engineering, art and math (STEAM) education. Not only are we going to build a brand new Red Apple K-8 STEAM School (coming Fall 2025), several schools are also getting new STEAM labs and makerspaces.

The second brand new school in the District will also be a K-8 school. A new Schulte K-8 School will be built on the same site as the current school and will open in fall 2025. The other two new K-8 schools will be expansions of current schools. Olympia Brown is undergoing a major expansion to become a K-8 school as is Starbuck. When Starbuck has its grand reopening in fall 2024, it will serve as the District's campus for all K-8 International Baccalaureate (IB) Programme students.

Other enhancements throughout the District include new secure vestibules (entrances) and upgrades to libraries, fine arts and athletic facilities. Several schools will get new gyms, classrooms and other additions.



ESSER Funds

RUSD has received \$81,423,630 from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund to address the impact COVID-19 has had and continues to have on our schools. Here is how we have allocated those funds through January 2023:

Addressing after-school and summer learning	\$1,229,499
Addressing long-term school closure	\$10,518,950
Educational technology	\$9,824,430
Mental health services and supports	\$868,063
Outreach/service delivery to special populations	\$286,733
Preparedness and response to COVID-19	\$2,057,787

For the 2021-22 fiscal year, RUSD received the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award from the Government Finance Officers Association. The Award recognizes governments for transparency in budgeting. This is the second year in a row RUSD's finance department has received the award.





Reading. It's the foundation of education. It helps children learn to make sense of the world around them, develop logic and problem-solving skills, enhance social skills and – it's entertaining! For all of these reasons, we are dedicating a great deal of resources in and outside the classroom to raising readers. Here are just a few ways we are investing in this crucial skill.

INSTRUCTION

Reading Coaches

Each RUSD school now has a reading coach dedicated to early literacy. These coaches work side-by-side with K-2 teachers to co-plan and integrate literacy into all aspects of the curriculum.

Early Literacy Summer Institute

During the summer of 2022, K-2 teachers participated in an Early Literacy Summer Institute to learn the science of reading and best teaching practices for reading. The District

is expanding these teachings to third through fifth grade teachers in the summer of 2023 so they have the skills necessary to help any students in their classes who may be not be reading at grade level.





FAMILY AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

For the 2022-23 school year, the RUSD Family and Community Engagement Team also turned its focus to early literacy, offering a Raising Readers to Succeed reading challenge with prizes, and also holding a book writing contest. The top scoring books will be printed together and available in all RUSD elementary school libraries. OUTSIDE SUPPORT

Schools of Hope

Schools of Hope returned to RUSD schools this year for the first time since the pandemic began. This partnership with the United Way of Racine County provides young children with tutors on a regular basis to increase reading achievement in the early grades. This year there are more than 53 volunteers working with students in first through third grades at Julian Thomas Elementary, Knapp Elementary, Mitchell K-8 and Wadewitz Elementary. Reading Corps

RUSD'S partnership with Reading Corps expanded significantly in the 2022-23 school year and there are plans for it to expand even further during the 2023-24 school year so each elementary school in the District has Reading Corps tutors.

This year there are 25 Reading Corps tutors working with kindergarten through third grade students in 13 RUSD schools, including Fratt, Julian Thomas, Knapp, Olympia Brown, Red Apple, Roosevelt, S.C. Johnson, Schulte, Wadewitz and West Ridge elementaries and Gifford, Gilmore Fine Arts and Mitchell K-8 schools. These tutors work one-on-one with students for 20 minutes a day, five days a week with a targeted focus on the reading skills they need to improve to be on pace with their peers.

"Our goal is to get them up to grade level so they are more actively participating in class," said Tiana Moore, a Reading Corps tutor at Julian Thomas. "Once a student has reached the grade level expectations, they graduate from the program."

Students may be in the program for a few weeks, a semester or longer depending on their needs. During the 2021-22 school year, 388 Racine students participated in the program and more than 250 exceeded their growth targets.

"I love to be able to see their self-confidence grow," Moore said. "When it finally clicks for them and they can see their own progress, I think that's the most rewarding thing."

YOUTH APPRENTICESHIPS

RUSD has partnered with Racine Area Manufacturers and Commerce

(RAMAC) to offer youth apprenticeships to our students, better preparing them for life after high school and the careers that await. The Youth Apprenticeship program integrates school-based and work-based learning to hone a student's employability and occupational skills. This year, RUSD has 199 youth apprentices in 143 companies. Here are just a few of them describing their invaluable experiences.



The Academies of Racine expanded its offerings during the 2022-23 school year to include two new pocket pathways at each high school. This partnership also allows students to earn not only high school credit in these courses, but also transcripted college credits at Gateway.
